

Online vs. In-house training vs. MOOCs

We often get questions like: "Shall I conduct this training as in-house training or online course?" or "Why should I book your online academy, there are many free MOOCs online?" There is no clear answer, so let's look at the merits of each course format. The colour coding (red = negative, green = positive) shows: each format has its strengths!
